The Royal Air Force College

When Lord Trenchard established the Royal Air Force College at Cranwell in 1920, it became the first air academy in the world. Thus, on the site of the old Royal Naval Air Service airfields, HMS Daedalus, the Royal Air Force, now just two years old, could begin to train its nucleus of permanent officers.

Between the Wars Cranwell was transformed, as the modest huts of the 1920s gave way to more permanent buildings, most notably the magnificent College Hall, completed in 1933. This expansion continued with the building of the Anglican Church of St Michael and All Angels to replace the historic hangar church, followed in the 1960s by Whittle and Trenchard Halls.

It is a great honour for the College to have Her Majesty The Queen as its Commandant-in-Chief, and The Queen's Colour is carried on all ceremonial occasions. In June 1970 the College celebrated its Fiftieth Anniversary, when Her Majesty The Queen and His Royal Highness The Prince Phillip, Duke of Edinburgh, attended a parade to mark the occasion.

Since 1947, when only pilots were trained at Cranwell, many changes have taken place including at one time the training of Navigators, Supply, Secretarial and Royal Air Force Regiment officers. At present the College has relinquished all specialist training except Supply and Engineering. The arrival of the College of Air Warfare from Manby in 1974 has further expanded the training commitments of the Royal Air Force College. In addition, pilot training is carried out at Cranwell by one of the 3 Basic Flying Training Schools.

In 1970 the three-year Flight Cadet courses were replaced by the Graduate Entry Scheme which lasted until 1978. Under this scheme, all entrants to the College were university graduates who then undertook a one-year course of officer and specialist training. The first entry of graduates arrived on 1st September 1970, and His Royal Highness Wing Commander The Prince of Wales was awarded his Wings and graduated with this entry. Since the closure of the Officer Cadet Training Unit at Henlow in 1980 all officers have received their initial officer training at the Royal Air Force College.

Cranwell is proud of its history and tradition, but it must also be up-to-date in outlook and training methods, accepting the many changes that accompany the dynamic development of air power.

Today's parade is the culmination of eighteen weeks of intensive initial officer training, and all the officers graduating today can be justly proud of their achievement in being awarded the Queen's Commission. As in the past, the experience and further training, may reach the highest ranks in the Service.

Queen's Colour

Armed forces have always carried with them signs and symbols of their units and strength. In modern days these signs and symbols take the form of colours, standards and badges; within the Royal Navy, the Army and the Royal Air Force these are the outward signs of their great traditions and their loyalty to the Sovereign. The highest award which a sovereign can bestow upon any military force for distinguished service is the award of a colour.

To acknowledge the great achievements of the Royal Air Force in peace and in two World Wars, and of the Royal Flying Corps and the Royal Naval Service in World War I, the late King George VI agreed to the granting of Colours for formations and establishments in the Royal Air Force. In 1947, His late Majesty expressed his wish that Colours should be presented to the Royal Air Force College, No 1 School of Technical Training at Royal Air Force Halton and the Royal Air Force in the United Kingdom. Subsequently Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II granted the award of Colours to the Royal Air Force Regiment, the Near East Air Force, the Far East Air Force, the Royal Air Force Germany.

Colours are always presented personally by the Sovereign, or by a person nominated to act on the Sovereign's behalf. The Royal Air Force College was granted the distinction of being the first Royal Air Force establishment to be presented with a Colour, and on 6th July 1948 His Majesty King George VI made the presentation.

A Colour presented to the Royal Air Force College by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II on 25th July 1960 was paraded for the last time on 30th May 1975 when Her Majesty presented the College with the new Colour. The new Colour is displayed in the dining room of the College Hall when the students are in residence. The earlier Queen's Colour and the original Colour presented by His late Majesty King George VI are laid up in the Church of St Michael and All Angels at the College.

Bad Weather

In the event of exceptionally bad weather the Graduation parade will be replaced by a Prizegiving Ceremony in Whittle Hall.

1055 hours	The Queen's Colour is marched in. Guests stand during the ceremonial.
1100 hours	The arrival of the Reviewing Officer and Commandant. Guests stand.
1102 hours	Welcoming Address by AOC and Commandant. All seated.
1104 hours	Presentation of Prizes by Reviewing Officer. All seated.
1110 hours	Reviewing Officer's Address. All seated.
1116 hours	The Queen's Colour is marched out. Guests stand during the ceremonial.
1118 hours	Graduating Squadron slow march out to "Auld Lang Syne". Guests remain seated.
1122 hours	Reviewing Officer and AOC depart stage. All stand.
1130 hours	Graduating cadets and guests are transported to St Michael and All Angels Church for the Service of Dedication which will begin at 1205 hours. Guests are requested to be seated by 1159 hours.
1240 hours	Pre-lunch drinks commence in College Hall Mess followed at 1320 hours by the Graduation Luncheon.
