Preface

The Old Cranwellian Association (OCA) was formed on 14 July 1926, largely at the instigation of graduates who had recently undergone officer training at the RAF College.

These ambitious young men were pioneers in every sense - military aviators in the making at a time when flight was still very much a perilous occupation; impressive young leaders, each of whom would go on to excel in their chosen profession; the high achievers who would become the very personification of the RAF's core values of *Respect, Integrity, Service and Excellence*. Despite the rigorous and strictly disciplined training regime endured for two intensive years, they had developed such an affection for their *alma mater* that they felt highly motivated to sustain their unique camaraderie by forming an "association of officers" unique to the College - *Cranwellians*.

A young Pilot Officer George Beamish - later to become a talented Irish and British Lions rugby international, the College's 11th Commandant and a distinguished Air Marshal - wrote to the College Journal Editor alerting him to the growing consensus of recently graduated cadets advocating the formation of such an association. It seems young Beamish and his fellow alumni were pushing at an open door. Within twelve months the then Commandant, Air Commodore AE Borton, brokered an inaugural meeting which agreed the purpose and constitution of the OCA. Through the medium of the College Journal magazine - very much the social medium of the College and its alumni at that time and in the decades to come - the OCA recorded its progress on maintaining contact with and between College alumni. Though contributions to the Journal waned from the 1970s, as did the Journal itself in later years, the OCA continued to support College alumni and to hold well attended Annual Reunions that maintained the bond between retired and serving Cranwellians, and the cadets undergoing their officer training. In April 2015, reflecting that the College had established itself as the single point of entry for all RAF officers, the members adopted a new constitution establishing the Cranwellian Association (CA), as it was to be renamed, as a registered charity.

This album depicts the story of the formation and development of the OCA. It is both chronology and reference manual constructed in three distinct volumes, reflecting the evolving officer training schemes at the College. Taking extracts from successive issues of the RAF College Journal and some OCA Meetings minutes, this album charts the progress of alumni, their careers, their sporting achievements and pastimes, their domestic lives and ultimately their passing. Their personal, unrivalled contributions to historic events (e.g. record breaking flights, air races like the Schneider Trophy, overseas conflicts such as WWII and Korean war, etc) are recognised in Journal extracts - "Old Cranwellian Notes" - that appeared in the majority of College Journals till 2016. We have added graduation photographs of the time, to help put faces to names - as spelt in personal records - where first mentioned in the Journal extracts.

Researching the history of the OCA has not been easy. Much of what we have collated draws fundamentally on those "Old Cranwellian Notes" published in College Journals between 1925 to 2016 (not inclusive) and from information on alumni held in the College archives. The fact that we have been able to make any attempt at recording the OCA's formative history is down very largely to the generosity of a number of alumni (e.g. AVM HW Heslop, Richard Hamilton, Graham Pitchfork and Mike Allistone) donating their personal copies of College Journals, and the incredible dedication and patience of Cranwellian Mike Smith (91 Entry) to convert these old Journals into FlipBooks available at http://www.cranwell-college.life/library/journals/libraryjournals-mobile.html. In the main, the College Journal Extracts of "Old Cranwellian Notes" contain news on alumni postings, promotions, honours & awards, and marriages and deaths. Particularly in the pre-WWII years, when powered flight was still in its infancy, there were also some interesting references to other notable alumni achievements. To make this album a little easier to read and to assimilate information, we list here some of the headline features and later an index by year of Journal editions and OCA AGM minutes. The underlined slide numbers and Table's underlined text contain hypertext links that enable access direct to the relevant slides. Each slide offers a link back to this page.

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Introduction - Volume 1 1924-1939

Volume 1 of this album charts the formation and establishment of the OCA within the Pre-WWII flight cadet alumni community. The recently graduated officer embarking on a Permanent Commission, the *Cranwellian*, was encouraged to join the OCA and to subscribe to the College Journal, the Journal being the primary 'institutional' medium for alumni to keep in touch and to share their experiences as their RAF careers developed.

Having proposed the formation of an OCA through the College Journal, it was not surprising, therefore, to see dedicated effort and resource assigned to an OCA section within the Journal. By the mid-1930s, the OCA contributions for inclusion in the College Journal had grown from a couple of pages to an average of 6 pages per Journal. And in addition to the efforts of the College Journal Editor, member subscriptions, Journal subscriptions and alumni correspondence would receive the dedicated attention of Mr JHS 'Harry' Lager, MBE, the Secretary of the OCA and a stalwart member of the College staff since its inception in 1919 until his retirement in 1951.

However, we start by headlining the letter, inaugural minutes and pioneers that constitute the historical formation of the "Association of Officers", as George Beamish proposed it, to be formally named the *Old Cranwellian Association*. Thereafter, we see how communication grew within and between alumni, topics covering promotions, postings and alumni "hatch, match and despatch".

Entirely subjectively, the editor of this album has highlighted (in red bordered text boxes) some of the correspondence unique to the OCA and the contributions from College alumni; obituaries are also highlighted (in black bordered text boxes) as we pay tribute to Cranwellians who paid the ultimate sacrifice in service of the Crown. Elsewhere, we add the remaining *Old Cranwellian Notes* and selected OCA Meetings Minutes that we have been able to recover, reproduced as a definitive record of OCA history.

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College Journal Extract - Autumn 1925 (Genesis)

The first mention of the Old Cranwellians (the first College alumni) is in the Autumn 1925 Journal:

Sir,

May I be permitted through your columns to draw attention to a matter which has been under quiet discussion amongst Cadets and ex-Cadets for some time. I refer to the question of a formation of an Association of Officers who have passed through the Royal Air Force Cadet College.

Opinions have been expressed strongly in favour of some such organization, and as an enthusiastic supporter of this project I should like to give some reasons for this.

(a) It would encourage esprit de corps and serve as a bond between past and present in the growth of the College.

(b) It would supply an organization to collect teams of the past for all sports and games against the present

(c) It would by its organization be able to supply news of all ex-Cadets through the pages of the ROYAL AIR FORCE CADET COLLEGE MAGAZINE.

(d) It would gradually accumulate small funds which could be used for College and reunion purposes.

These are some of the more obvious advantages of such an organization; others would undoubtedly be found.

I suggest that the membership of this organization should consist of ex-Cadets and Officers chosen by invitation who have been connected with the College.

Is it asking too much, Sir, to suggest that you enclose in this copy of the magazine, at the end of the magazine, a red slip which can be signed, stamped, and posted to the Secretary Old Cranwellians' Association, c/o The Cadet College Magazine, Cranwell, Lincs, by all who are willing to signify their interest in some such organization.

In order that there may be no more delay in forming such an association the writer of this letter has been urged to arrange a reunion dinner before next Christmas; and to bring up teams to play the College at the end of this term at "Rugger" and "Soccer." The slip will be found opposite.]

College Journal Extract - Spring 1926 (Formation)

The extract below records the formation of the OCA and the announcement to College alumni.

OLD CRANWELLIAN ASSOCIATION.

Such was the response to the letter of Pilot-Officer G. R. Beamish, published in our last issue, that steps towards the formation of an Association of Ex-Cadets have been taken with some definite results. About seventy-five officers who have passed through the College supported the scheme immediately.

As a result, it was possible to arrange a Rugby football match between the Past and Present; and as many officers who were not playing accepted the invitation of the College to be present, a preliminary meeting was held at which several resolutions were passed and a tentative constitution adopted.

The name "Old Cranwellian Association" was adopted unanimously, and its objects were

declared to be much as they appeared in Pilot-Officer Beamish's letter :-

(a) To establish an organization to keep ex-Cadets in close touch with the College.

(b) To promote games, sports, and reunions between the past and present.

(c) To create a fund to be used for the furtherance of College and Service interests.

The annual subscription was fixed at 20s., which will include subscriptions to the magazine, and which will be paid by the customary Banker's Order.

A Dinner is to be held annually.

An ordinary form of constitution was drafted, and it was decided to ask Air Vice-Marshal C. A. H. Longcroft, C.B., C.M.G., D.S.O., A.F.C., to be first President of the Association.

This he has kindly consented to be, and it is now intended to hold the first general meeting in London, about the first week in May, on the occasion of the Triangular Sports Contest at the Queen's Club with the R.M.A. and R.M.C.

The proposal is supported very warmly by the present generation of Cadets and by all officers in close touch with the College. So it is to be hoped that all ex-Cadets who have not yet sent in their application for membership will hasten to do so, in order that arrangements may be made for a first general meeting.

All those who have signified their wish to join the Association will be notified regarding the

agenda, etc., for the meeting and the proposed draft constitution.

Temporarily, Capt. Brachi is acting as organizing secretary, and he will be pleased to receive any suggestions and assistance that can be given to him.

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First OCA President and Vice-Presidents

Longroft, together with Trenchard, Smuts and Churchill, was a Founder of the RAF College whose portrait hangs in Founders' Gallery.

Borton was extremely supportive of Beamish's initiative and brokered the inaugural meeting of the OCA.

Rees is one of five Cranwellians to have been awarded the VC - two in WWI and three in WWII.

Old Cranwellian Association The mangural meeting of the above was held at the R.A.F. Cadel College, Cramoll, on July 14th 1926 at the Ria Commodore A.E. Borton, C.B. 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NOTES ON THE PARTICIPANTS

Vice-Chairman/Vice-President - Air Cdre AE Borton

The RAF College's second Commandant (15 Aug 23 - 1 Nov 26) convened the Inaugural Meeting of the Old Cranwellian Association on 14 July 1926. President - AVM CRH Longcroft

AVM Longcroft was the RAF College's first Commandant and, together with Churchill, Smuts and Trenchard, cofounded the College. The RAF took over the College from the RN on 1 November 1919 and the first course started on 5 February 1920 (Founders' Day). Vice-President - Gp Capt LHB Rees

Gp Capt Rees was the Chief Flying Instructor at Cranwell and Assistant Commandant at the RAF College between 26 March 1923 and 29 December 1924. Although the College declares only one flight cadet who won the VC, Rees in fact was one of five 'Cranwellians' who won this honour, another like Rees during WWI and three during WWII. Proposer - Fg Off ESC Davis

Davis graduated from F22 Entry - the intake of February 1922 - in December 1923. A pilot, he was killed in action flying a Sunderland Mk 1 over Trondheim Fjord, Norway, on 19 March 1941.

Seconder - Fg Off HM Mellor

Mellor graduated from S21 Entry - September 1921 - in July 1923. Also a pilot, he was killed in action on 26 May 1940, failing to return from operations over France, in his Beaufort Mk1 of 22 Sqn, Coastal Command. Possibly due to other operational commitments, he does not appear to have joined the newly formed OCA Committee.

Committee Members

GR Beamish graduated from F23 Entry with the College Sword of Honour in December 1924. A former Ireland and British Lion rugby international, his distinguished career included a tour as the 11th Commandant of the RAF College (1 January 1949 - 31 July 1950). JG Hawtrey graduated from the College's first RAF Entry F20 in December 1921. Awarded the CBE, his distinguished career is summarised at https://www.rafweb.org/Biographies/Hawtrey.htm.

N Carter graduated from F21 Entry with the Sword of Honour in December 1922 and went on to be awarded a CB and DFC and to be Mentioned in Despatches during WWII.

TN McEvoy graduated with the Sword of Honour from S23 Entry in July 1925 and went onto a distinguished career recognised by the awards of KCB, CB, CBE OBE and two MiDs. His career profile is at https://www.rafweb.org/Biographies/McEvoy.htm.

EB Webb was another Sword of Honour winner, graduating with J24 Entry - January 1924 - in December 1925. He was killed in action whilst Station Commander at RAF Snaith, when his Wellington crashed on 2 April 1942 over Villacoublay on operations to Poissy. He had received an MiD during WWII.

CJ Collingwood graduated in December 1921 from F20 Entry, having entered as a Naval cadet. He went on to win a DFC and OBE before retiring from the RAF on 28 April 1948.

D MacFadyen graduated in July 1922 from S20 Entry, with the Sword of Honour, the RM Groves Memorial Prize and the accolade as 'Student Scholar of the College'. His talents and potential clearly spotted by the College, he went onto a distinguished career, winning a KCB, CB, CBE and two MiDs. GL Worthington graduated from S21 Entry in July 1923 with the Sword of Honour, Abdy Gerrard Fellowes Prize and the accolade as 'Student Scholar of the College'. RLR Atcherley graduated from S22 Entry in July 1924 with the RM Groves Memorial Prize. He was the first flight cadet to become College Commandant (the 10th 1 October 1946 - 1 January 1949, handing over to George Beamish). He received KCB, CBE, the AFC and Bar and two MiDs in his distinguished career, summarised at: https://www.rafweb.org/Biographies/AtcherleyR.htm. College Journal Extract - Autumn 1926 (Membership)

The extract below records the inaugural meeting of the OCA.

OLD CRANWELLIAN ASSOCIATION.

THE inaugural meeting of the Association, which was postponed from May 8th by the strike, was held at the Cadet College on July 14th, on the occasion of the Past and Present cricket match.

A tennis match also took place.

It was most unfortunate that many who had undertaken to represent the

Past were detained by duty at the last minute.

The meeting was held just before Mess, and the attendance numbered thirty-five. Air-Commodore A. E. Borton, C.B., C.M.G., D.S.O., A.F.C., took the chair.

It was decided that the purpose of the Association is-

(a) To organize an annual reunion at the Cadet College, and to promote and organize games between Past and Present.

(b) To found a fund, by means of a small annual subscription, to be used for the furtherance of Cadet College interests and charities.

A constitution was then arranged for the Association, of which it is only

necessary here to quote the main points.

Membership is open to anyone who has been admitted to and passed through the Cadet College, and the Association has power to invite to become members, or honorary members, officials of the R.A.F.

The annual subscription was fixed at 20s., which includes subscription

to the Magazine. This must be paid by banker's order form.

The Association will meet annually in the summer at Cranwell, and a guest night will follow the meeting.

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It is hoped to limit the number of subscriptions to cover life membership.

A general Committee meeting was held in October, when the following Executive Committee was formed: F./Officer R. L. Atcherley, P./Officer G. R. Beamish, F./Officer J. G. Hawtrey, P./Officer T. N. McEvoy, F./Officer H. R. D. Waghorn. It was decided that names for honorary membership can only be submitted after approval by the Committee.

OLD CRANWELLIAN NEWS.

He was one of the most popular fellows who have ever passed out from this College, which he represented at rugger, cricket and athletics. His commanding officer wrote of him that "his loss is a great blow to the squadron, for he was a most likeable messmate and a very stout fellow. That was exactly our opinion of him here, and we recall, too, his venturesome spirit, his whimsical humour, and his absolute loyalty to his friends.

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THE SCHNEIDER TROPHY.

A VIEWPOINT BY FLIGHT-LIEUTENANT H. R. D. WAGHORN, A.F.C.

It was with rather mixed feelings that I took my first look at the sea on the morning of the Schneider Trophy race. After a period of training made up of a series of disappointments, I fully expected that the "Weather King" had some card up his sleeve which he would produce on that memorable day. It did not require much to cause a postponement, which would be a source of disappointment to thousands of people. The slightest swell or white horse on the one hand and dead calm on the other were the limits that bounded our capabilities.

The day was unique, a deep blue sky of a type rarely seen in this country, coupled with an amazingly good visibility. At the time, it was blowing ten miles an hour, and all was bustle on the tarmac. Some machines were already on their pontoons, while others were black with mechanics using the last minute for finishing-touches. The machine that I was to fly, the Supermarine N247, was not out yet.

Only eight hours before, one of the Rolls-Royce mechanics noticed a small bit of metal on the electrode of one of the plugs. Uneasy, they removed the block to find a seized piston and a hopelessly scored cylinder. What bad luck! No one considered it possible to be able to change the cylinder block of this particular engine in the time left. Under ordinary conditions, Rolls would not undertake it while in the machine; and it was midnight before the race! The story of how that block was changed, how their specialists (by chance in Southampton) were woken by police, is well known. Suffice it to say that these mechanics did it, and by so doing saved the trophy.

It was about 10.30 on Saturday morning when N247 came out of the hangar and had its final run-up. Soon after this, she was put on her pontoon and joined the queue of shipping which was still emerging in one long stream from Hamble River and Southampton Water. She had about two miles to go to the place that had been decided on for our take-off point. This was between Lee-on-Solent and Calshot, and so chosen because of the wind which was south-east. Here were already anchored the big pontoon and the three Macchis and our other pontoons with Greig's and Atcherley's machines on board. There was also the official starting ship—the Medea.

At about seven minutes to two, my engine was started by Lovesay, the Rolls expert, and was run by him for barely two minutes. I then climbed in and made myself as comfortable as possible. At two minutes to two I was lowered into the water and started to take off immediately.

I will here digress slightly and describe in detail the procedure followed up after opening the throttle, as the S6 was in many ways peculiar. Owing to the slow revs. of engine and propeller, coupled with the great power and consequent great torque effect, the first thing that happened on opening up the engine was that the left wing tried to dig itself into the water. This almost submerged the left float, and the drag so produced swung the machine rapidly to the left, making her quite uncontrollable; the more the machine swung to the left of the wind, the more rapid did the swing become until centrifugal force became greater than the drag of the left float, and she would suddenly throw her right wing down rather violently, making it essential to shut off the engine.

With a fairly fresh wind and full load, it is advisable to take off directly into wind, and with that end in view we found it essential to point the machine about 70 degrees to the right of the wind and to have right rudder on from the start.

The machine then runs along with its left wing a few inches from the water across wind, but not swinging. She is clear of the spray, which up to 30 m.p.h. completely envelops the pilot. Having got her, therefore, running across wind at 40 to 50 m.p.h., one is now confronted with what is really the trickiest part of the proceedings, and that is to get her into wind without letting her swing right round, which she will want to do. Once left rudder is applied, the machine will accelerate rapidly and, provided you have not put on too much rudder, should reach her hump speed by the time she is directly into wind. At this point she assumes a new position on the water—very much lower in front—and accelerates rapidly up to taking-off speed. She seems to leave the water at about 100 miles an hour, and I have never been able to take off with full load without two or three bounces.

To return to the race, once off the water I made my way towards Old Castle Point, and then turned left and dived down over the starting-line at about 350 miles an hour. The pylons were mounted on destroyers, and stood out quite well, provided they were not anchored against a background of shipping. We could not get a view directly ahead, and had to pick up the correct line largely while turning the previous pylon. On the long legs, we picked our course mainly by landmarks or shipping which we passed near. As an example, the Seaview turn was anchored, say, half a mile from the shore. By plotting our radius of turn on the chart, and from previous practice, we knew that we should have to have the coast, say, 500 yards on our right. By aiming to do this, we would arrive in approximately the correct position; when about 200 yards off the pylon we could see it, so that the actual turn itself was gauged with the pylon in view.

The first lap was naturally the most difficult, because we were not used to the various groups of shipping which afterwards helped so much to our course-keeping. As an example, while passing the Seaview turn on my first lap, I looked for the Chichester turn-ship and picked out the only isolated vessel in that area. I made for it, and while still some little way from it saw the pylon away on my left. I had been quite unable to see it, as it had had a background of shipping immediately behind it. The ship which I had mistaken for the turn-ship was in fact an oil tanker, and should not have been allowed to stray where it had. Atcherley, indeed, turned round it. My own détour cost me six miles an hour, and that is the reason my first lap speed was only 324. From the Chichester turn I could see the Southsea pylon while still turning and had no difficulty at all in passing it, the esplanade on my right being also a great help. Next I came to what was the most difficult leg of the course-that from Southsea to Cowes-as there was no land and practically no shipping to guide one on approaching the turn. To make matters more interesting for the competitors, someone had conveniently parked a flotilla of destroyers immediately behind the pylon; hence the amazing turns of some of the Italians embracing all the destroyers. I think in any future race (if there is one) the authorities should make quite sure that there be a lane quite clear of ships behind the pylon as viewed from the direction of approaching aircraft; this, of course, is not the same thing as a lane in continuation of the actual course, since the aircraft approach the turn very wide. Once round the Cowes turn the course was plain sailing again, there being plenty of shipping and the shore of the Isle of Wight to help one.

I had completed several laps, everything was going beautifully—never a miss from the engine, and the machine handling perfectly—when I noticed the Italian Macchi diving towards the starting-line just as I was coming up to




the Cowes turn; at the Seaview turn I could not see him at all; at the Chichester turn I saw him a speck in front, and at the Southsea turn I saw him disappearing over Alverstoke—this time much nearer, and as I was obviously overtaking him rapidly, the question was, would I overtake him on the straight before the Cowes turn or just after? I hoped for the latter, for if I should catch him before the turn, I should not be able to see him. However, it planned out as I hoped; for, on rounding the Cowes pylon, I saw him just coming out of his turn a few hundred yards in front. I decided to pass him on the inside, and swung about a hundred yards to the left to clear him. I passed him about half-way down the straight.

By now, I had completed five laps and everything was going just as it should. The air in the cockpit was very hot, but, owing to a stream of fresh air from the ventilating pipe over my face. I was not too uncomfortable. An

By now, I had completed five laps and everything was going just as it should. The air in the cockpit was very hot, but, owing to a stream of fresh air from the ventilating pipe over my face, I was not too uncomfortable. An attempt to rest my knees on the sides of the fuselage was abruptly stopped when I discovered that they were to all intents and purposes red-hot; a slight exaggeration, perhaps, but that is what it felt like, and through my slacks, too! I was flying at about 150 to 200 feet, as I found that at that height I got the best view of the course, and it was sufficiently low to be able to keep level. I had been running all the time somewhat below full throttle, as, owing to the unexpected increase in power and consequent petrol consumption of the engine, she would not last the course with the petrol we were able to carry safely. The rate that petrol can be poured out of a two-gallon tin will give some idea of the rate that the engine was consuming its petrol during that race. I had therefore been told on no account to use full throttle, as I should not finish the course; imagine, then, my feelings when the engine momentarily cut right out and started missing badly just after I had finished what I imagined was my sixth lap! Would the Rolls engineers ever believe that I had not given full throttle? I began to gain height and continued round the course with the engine spluttering and only taking about half throttle. I climbed as much as possible, in the hope that, should she run right out, I could perhaps glide the remaining distance over the line; I was, incidentally, getting a very fine bird's-eye view of the entire course, but under the circumstances was not impressed. I got to the Cowes turn and, while banking, the engine cut out completely, and I was forced to land off Old Castle Point—only a few miles short of the finish. I leave my feelings to your imagination.

It was twenty minutes later that I learnt I had done an extra lap, and I also realized how deadly accurate had been Lovesay's estimation of the petrol consumption.





OLD CRANWELLIAN NOTES.

AT Buckingham Palace on March 11th, F./Lieut. H. R. D. Waghorn and P./Officer McKechnie were introduced into the presence of H.M. the King and invested with their respective honours-the Air Force Cross, and Medal of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire-for deeds which are well known to all Old Cranwellians.

Empire Gallantry Medal, subsequently changed to a George Cross

"Flight Cadet William Neil McKechnie, Royal Air Force. On the 20th June, 1929, an aeroplane piloted by Flight Cadet C. J. Giles crashed on landing at Cranwell Aerodrome and burst into names. The pilot was stunned but managed to release his safety belt and fall out of the machine in a dazed condition. Flight Cadet McKechnie, who had landed in another aeroplane about the same time some two hundred yards away, left his machine and ran at full speed towards the scene of the accident. The petrol had spread over an area of about ten vards diameter in full blaze, with Giles lying in it, semiconscious. McKechnie, without hesitation, ran into the flames and pulled out Giles. who was badly burned about the legs and face, with his Sidcot suit and clothes actually burning. After dragging him clear of the names, during the process of which he was scorched and superficially burned. McKechnie proceeded to extinguish the flames of Giles' burning clothing. By this time, the machine was in full blaze, with F/C Sgt WN McKechnie GC the petrol spreading along the ground so that without McKechnie's assistance, there is no doubt Giles would have been burned to death, as he was quite incapable of moving himself. Ultimately the machine was entirely destroyed by fire and the ground for some distance around was completely burned up by the spread of the ignited petrol."

"I am afraid what little information I have given you in this letter will be quite valueless for publication, and I feel that I should be better qualified to do this later on, when we indulge in combined exercises with the other two Staff Colleges, during which time we take them on at various games."

F./Lieut. F. G. Cator writes: "I have just returned from a tour of duty in the Aden Command, during the latter part of which I was fortunate enough to become attached to the Anglo-Ethiopian Boundary Commission in British Somaliland. As a result of this, I spent sixteen months with a survey flight from my squadron-No. 8 (B.) Squadron-on the Abyssinian border, during which we photographed about 400 miles of frontier for subsequent mapping purposes. I had one flying officer with me; Weait being with me during the early part of the work in 1932, and subsequently Sales. We lived under canvas all the time and were a completely selfcontained and mobile unit, having our own W/T, M/T, and, of course, innumerable camels. I found the life ideal, since the work was very interesting and the opportunities for sport exceptional. We built our own tennis court and golf course (of sorts) and had frenzied encounters at football with some of the more civilized natives. Both I and my junior, and also two selected airmen, did a lot of shooting and secured some quite good antelope and gazelle 'heads,' but no lions or leopards; I encountered one of the only five elephants still in Somaliland. I think everyone in the Air Survey Flight was sorry to leave Somaliland, but we completed the photography last March and had to return to Aden. The Boundary Commission is still there arguing with the Abyssinians, and I wish I were with them."



F./Officer J. Grierson, R.A.F.O., has been unfortunate in his third F./Lieut. F. W. Hudleston writes from Kohat of many reunions with effort to fly to America by the Arctic route with the aid of wireless "homing" apparatus. In the first attempt last summer his seaplane was seriously damaged in taking off from Reykjavik, in Iceland, for Greenland, and the flight was abandoned. He left Rochester on 20th July this year in a new seaplane and flew to Reykjavik, but was again unlucky in taking off for the crossing to Greenland, his machine colliding with a boat in the harbour. Mr. Grierson brought the broken metal float of the seaplane back to England by steamer. After getting it repaired he returned to Iceland and resumed his flight from Reykjavik.

On his next attempt to fly to Angmagssalik he was forced to land in a fiord twenty miles east of it, from which he sent a message asking for help and stating that he had food for ten days. In a message to The Times

"The weather was excellent until ninety miles from Iceland, where a thick cloud bank covered the sea. I decided to fly above the cloud, and saw no sea for three hours. Consequently it was not possible to judge the wind. The cloud ended fifty miles short of Greenland.

"The coast stood out in black and white with many icebergs. Knowing the map to be unreliable, I tried to find Angmagssalik by dead-reckoning. This failed, the homing apparatus again being jammed by trawlers. I continued flying along the coast for an hour without seeing any signs of human habitation, though I had actually flown straight over Angmagssalik. Turning back to where dead-reckoning had first indicated a settlement, I landed with ten gallons of petrol in the only moderately ice-free fiord visible, having before doing so sent a message asking that a search be made. My trailing aerial was torn away by an iceberg. Taxi-ing through the ice to the end of the fiord, I beached my aeroplane, Robert Bruce, among the boulders in the glacial stream. The tide left the machine dry, and I prepared to wait at least three days for searchers. I tried taking pemmican without much joy. Having removed the battery box from the cabin, it was possible to huddle between the main petrol tank and the wireless set. The temperature was below freezing-point during the night.

"When filling the window gaps with adhesive tape this morning suddenly I heard a noise like wild birds screaming. To my very great joy I saw

Eskimos running over the rocks towards me. I was scarcely able to believe Accounts); Frank Inglis, who is in G.H.Q.; Brister, whom one used to while one Eskimo shot a salmon.

"At high tide I unbeached the Bruce and took off between the icefloes, landing here safely a quarter of an hour later. All the population, Eskimos moor up the seaplane. I am the first visitor here for nearly a year. They had seen me fly directly over the settlement yesterday. I shall continue my flight to Godthaab to-morrow, after repairing the aerial, if the weather

A letter has been received by the Editor, from Iraq, and reads:-" Dear Editor,

"Many thanks for your letter, which I am afraid I have been a long time answering. Also I wish to thank you for an excellent and very welcome copy of the Magazine, which was a joy to me-even more so, I think, than to many Old Cranwellians, because most of my short term in the Service has been spent at Cranwell, and I have seen it from the point of view of the slave and the slave-driver. I sincerely hope that one day I shall be posted back there to some duty in connection with the College.

" I was looking through the Air Force List and noticed that I have been at Cranwell with quite a lot of people, starting with Constantine's and Beisiegel's term, which came to Cranwell in January, 1926, and ending with the present second term (Piers Kelly's term), which will leave in July, 1935.

"I am afraid I cannot give you much Old Cranwellian news because I am not living at Hinaidi, but in a house near Baghdad, but those I have seen round and about are Brian Yarde, who has just gone home on completion of his tour out here; John Marson, who is at the Depot at Hinaidi; and Franks, who is attached to the Iraq Air Force. Franks lives close to me and was most kind to me when I first arrived: I see quite a lot of him. Also I have seen John Owen, who has just come out and is in 70 Squadron. Another letter to the Editor runs:-

"It is rather difficult to remember whom I have seen or not seen, but as I am sure it is what you want, here are some more names. Oliver is in Geoffrey Stephenson, who is Personal Assistant to Air Vice-Marshal the A.O.C. B. R. Fraser and myself are living together with a third flying officer (not Cranwell, but from C.U.A.S.) in this house, and studying this infernal language. Among people I have seen (not Old Cranwellians,

that I had been found so soon, and grasped each Eskimo firmly by the see at Cranwell a lot in connection with Trade Test Boards; and finally, hand, the only way of showing my great gratitude and relief. Behind came last but by no means least, F./Lieut. Fagan, who flew over here about a the pastor who had brought the expedition. He gave me tea and bread, fortnight ago to ferry an aeroplane over to Egypt. It was a very pleasant surprise seeing him again (I saw him for a brief second on the way out while we were passing through the Suez Canal).

"I am afraid that finishes me with regard to Old Cranwellians, and now and Danes, turned out to welcome me, and the Governor rowed out to I will give you a little about myself. I am liking it quite a lot out here and am enjoying my job, which has good prospects afterwards, and I must say from that point of view I am content.

> 'The language study interests me and I am able to do a certain amount in that direction. Of course, like everybody else, I go through waves of depression and wonder why the devil I ever set myself in for it, but then I recover and find that I am happy and like the work. I miss my uniform and aeroplane sometimes, but that is merely a childish sense of one's own importance, and, anyway, I shall appreciate them so much more when I go back to a flying job. As for the actual country; at the moment I am having the life, but as you know the country is just about the most unattractive thing there is to look at in the world. But I am keeping fit, playing a lot of squash and tennis, and have a useful pony. I enclose a picture, and I am hunting a great deal with the Exodus Hunt, which gives good sport and so have many useful runs, notably one particularly long one recently when the Master, Whitworth, Bradford and myself were the only ones who saw the remaining hound kill.

> "I am afraid there is a lack of subjects, and my literary talent is such that you won't be getting anything which might be of interest for the Magazine. But if I do, or see anything that might be of general interest, I will try to record it on paper. This letter will have to do instead; and on your part, if you have a moment, don't forget I am intensely interested in Cranwell, the Blankney Hounds, and England in

"Remember me to my friends."

Another letter runs :-

"I returned to the inner fold on 12th March this year, but although intended for 'A' Squadron I have finished up as something to do with the Armament Training Corps, in company with several ex-Cranwellians. Bartlett (newly promoted) is at Catfoss; Patch and Cary (the latter also newly promoted) are at North Coates Fitties; and Beamish and Blackden are two of the shining lights at Sutton Bridge.

"On the Staff of the Air Armament School there are F./Lieut. Homer and F./Officer Louden, whilst F./Officers MacDonald and Reed are in the Flights of 'B' Squadron. Dashper, Eeles and Hobson are just doing the 'A' Course, and Spreckley is well on the way to his astral qualification.

"F./Lieut. Desmond came here originally as Station Adjutant, but he is now Acting Chief Instructor owing to a reshuffle of jobs due to the posting of the Commandant without an immediate relief.

"You will have noticed that at last an Air Armament Group has been formed. I take it that the striking arm of our Service will now receive more and more consideration."

Another letter runs:-

"We set out from Calcutta and called at Rangoon, Singapore, Hong Kong, Shanghai, and so to Japan. It took us a month to get there as the ship's top speed was twelve knots, and we were delayed by fog in the China Sea. We spent two days in Japan (and a great deal of money) and decided to go by P. & O. as far as Singapore on the return journey. This ship is supposed to be one of the company's latest, but it is really only a glorified boarding-house, and the food is not good. I expect you know this part of the world fairly well. I confess that this trip has revealed to me how fortunate we are to be stationed in India. The life led by the English in Japan, under the control of the Chauvinist Japanese Government, is a dog's life, and I don't think that the English in Shanghai, Hong Kong, or Singapore, are very much better off, as living is expensive."

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

In future all officers who are appointed to permanent commissions in the R.A.F. from the Universities will be trained at the R.A.F. College,

Cranwell, instead of at one of the Flying Training Schools. The first

entries under this scheme were posted to Cranwell on 29th September, 1934 The University candidates for permanent commissions must be under 25 years of age, have taken a degree after three years' residence, and have been recommended by the governing body of a recognized University. After passing the Medical Board at the Air Ministry they are attached to a flying unit during their long vacation. If the Commanding Officer's report is favourable they are granted a commission and posted to Cranwell and given twelve months' seniority.

The University entries normally will have five months' training instead of the ten months given to those appointed to short-service commissions.

The R.A.F. Squash contest was closely fought in 1934, and this is The Times' account of the final:



There are none of the advantages in the way of sport that one associates with foreign service. Both shooting and riding are very expensive, and probably more difficult to get than at home.

"We are twenty miles down the Nile in the desert. The old spa of Helouan-les-Bains has gone down and down ever since the war. Cairo, of course, brings one back to civilization and is a complete change from camp life. The winter climate is very pleasant and I get any amount of rugger, hockey, squash and golf. George Beamish is now in '45' and does our rugger a lot of good. He captained the R.A.F. team that beat the Army in Egypt this winter and played his usual sterling game. This

" '45' has no operational area as nearly every other general-purpose squadron abroad has, so we get about a great deal, being the reserve squadron for Iraq and the Sudan. I got a week's trip to Iraq in a flight last year, and this year the whole squadron of fifteen aircraft went over there for three weeks. It was a good experience and I now feel I know a great deal about the country, especially having studied 'the operations against Sheikh Mahmud in '30 and '31' since we got back.

"I wonder how long you were out there? I remember the sketch maps of the Rowanduz and Sul Passes and pictures of Mongol hordes coming through them. The hospitality from 30, 55, 70 and 84, the cars and Depot was overwhelming, and I met a great many friends.

"I lunched and went to the races with Corbally one day; he is now S.S.O., Basra Area, I believe, and Fraser has gone to the same job in Aden. Good experience, I suppose, but I'm afraid I would not enjoy

I also met Inglis, who seems in very good form. Bradford is now p.a. in Baghdad to the A.O.C.

Charlie Whitworth is doing an extra year and seems to spend his life steering Vics and horses, which is a pleasant life. Constantine was over here at the time of the display. Williams was my host at Shaibah.

'Andrew Combe, of 203, I missed, as he was at Melbourne on the cruise. In Egypt there are numerous Old Cranwellians, especially in 208. In the display an Old Cranwellian flight of five did the message picking-up and others took part in a bombing attack on a tent.

"Last spring I went on the South African cruise, which was of course a grand experience and grand fun. The scenery, big game and native types I'll never forget, and it was most interesting hearing the different ideas of the people one meets in the various countries. I came back for three months' leave, which was just about perfect."

Another Old Cranwellian writes:-

"The most ancient of Cranwellians out here are Beazley and Riccard. The former, after leaving the College, found his way to the Straits Settlements Police, and is now A.D.C. to H.E. The Governor.

"Riccard is in 205 Squadron, also Mitchell is Squadron Adjutant. Golding is in 100 Squadron doing many things in the athletic world, particularly boxing and rugger.

"He played regularly for the United Services team, and played for the South of Malaya and the North, which is the peak of Rugby football out here. Gillan, More, McIlwaine and Burwood have been here at odd times in the Eagle, and Addenbrooke and Brotherhood came from India with 11 Squadron and stayed a week.

"Baker and Rhys came through from India on leave to Japan, and one of our people who has just returned from leave in Australia met Baker in Brisbane. I think that is all I can tell you about Old Cranwellians.

"Singapore is a dull place, although the R.A.F. Base is very pleasant. It has an advantage-it is in the centre of a very interesting part of the world, and travel is cheap. I have recently come back from a leave to Australia, going down the east coast via Batavia and East Australia, across the continent by train, and back from Sydney by way of Manila and Hong Kong-which was very enjoyable and interesting.

One thing I have done which may interest you, was to start an R.A.F. Base Magazine here (at least, it is a Tory magazine), and I am going to send you some copies by ship mail. I received a copy of the History of

An Old Cranwellian writes, on 10th July, 1935, from the Air Ministry: "I'm afraid my doings of late, while interesting enough to me, have not been such as to be of much value to the JOURNAL. The last time I wrote to you, I believe, I was Fleet-Air-Arming in Hong Kong; since then I have returned home, had a short spell in a fighter squadron, and put in another three and a half years with the Fleet, this time in the Mediterranean. The F.A.A. still seems to be unpopular with junior officers-I cannot think why. I've had the best part of nine years in it, and had the time of my life, including visits to France, Spain, Italy, Greece, Cyprus, Egypt, Aden, India, Ceylon, Malaya, Borneo and China—and all at King

I suggested to the Air Council (through the usual Service channels, of course) that if I was really competent to instruct in navigation it would be a kindly act of grace on their part to allot me the appropriate symbol in the Air Force List, and, what was more important, the appropriate ante-date, but after some months' deliberation they regretted that they couldn't see matters in that light, so that was that. After a year of schoolmastering, I was suddenly hooked out of Leuchars and sent here, to the German Intelligence section. The work, as you can imagine, has been intensely interesting-but I could wish that the Powers would find a different name for it. People are continually asking me what department of the Ministry I am in, and when I say 'Intelligence' they laugh. I can't think why.

"Please remember me to such old friends as remain at Cranwell."

He leaves a gap in he Service which will be very hard to fill, and his large circle of friends R.A.F. College, Cranwell. extend their heartfelt sympathy to Mrs. Martingell.-S. F. V."

It was of rather an advanced type obtaining its best effects through his own misfortunes, and strongly imbued with the 'bring out your deck-chairs, boys, here's someone landing down wind 'attitude which runs right through Service life and is such a mystery to people who have never encountered it in bulk, and who cannot under-

"I would rather have Tinsyde as a companion than anybody. He was always cheerful; could see the amusing side of the most ominous situations was brave and supremely honest both with himself and other people.

"It is difficult to say more without becoming reminiscent, as one nemories of him will always be of the individual thing that he did, rathe than of the complete person that he was. He had no exceptional book learning at the expense of common practical experience; no sudden brilliance at the expense, perhaps, of other people; he was sound because he though along the right lines; trusted because he was honest; and loved because after all, common sense, honesty and humour are all that one should ask for in Service friendships. I for one know that there will never be anyone quite the same.-C. C."





At the end of dinner, F./Lieut. A. King-Lewis, the Chairman of the Association, said:

"As far as Cranwell is concerned, you know as well as I do that there are a hundred and one activities, and I cannot possibly mention them all. Most of them are very fully described in the JOURNAL, which I know you all read from cover to cover. I think you will all agree, by the way, that the last effort of 'the Prof's 'was a very excellent one. I should like to mention in particular the Riding School. It is now an integral part of life at the College, and is likely to be even more so owing to the addition of a fifth horse, which the Association bought, and for which we are providing the upkeep for one year. Sir Philip Sassoon has kindly offered to present two more horses for the Riding School. So far, we have been unable to take advantage of his offer, as our stables are full and the income of the Riding School cannot provide for the upkeep of more than the five horses we have. However, we are trying to persuade the Air Ministry to give us a covered Riding School, so that the cadets' riding may not be so much curtailed during the winter months at Cranwell, when davlight is short and the ground frozen. So far, the Air Ministry has rejected with scorn our contention that the cadets are pining for a new Drill Shed, which must have a tan floor to reduce the deterioration of rifles and develop the cadets' marching ability. But we still hope that the rebuilding of Cranwell will make available some building which can be converted to a Riding School; and when this time comes we shall remember Sir Philip's offer.

"You will also be pleased to hear that the new Squash Courts have been opened, and there are now four courts available.

"Perhaps the most interesting function at the College this year was the unveiling of the two life-size portraits of our Patron and our President. which were presented to the R.A.F. College by our Association. The unveiling ceremony was performed by Lady Trenchard in July last. The portraits face everybody who enters by the main entrance of the College; I can think of no more suitable position for the portraits of these two distinguished officers, who did so much for the College.

"I shall not occupy your time any longer except to say how sorry we all are at Cranwell to lose our Air Officer Commanding, Air Vice-Marshal Cave-Browne-Cave, who has kindly taken the chair to-night, in the absence of our President. On your behalf as Chairman I should also like to take

this opportunity of thanking him for the interest he has displayed in our Association and the work he has done for it whilst he has been at Cranwell."

OLD CRANWELLIAN NOTES

Air Vice-Marshal Henry Meyrick Cave-Browne-Cave, C.B., D.S.O., D.F.C., is the Air Officer Commanding, No. 16 (Reconnaissance) Group, Royal Air Force.

He joined the Royal Flying Corps (Naval Wing) from the Royal Navy in April, 1914. During the War he served with the Royal Naval Air Service and Royal Air Force, and commanded the Seaplane Stations at Dunkirk and Malta. For his war services he was awarded the D.S.O. and the D.F.C. He was granted a permanent commission in the Royal Air Force with the rank of Wing Commander in 1919 and later served on the staff of the School of Technical Training (Apprentices), Royal Air Force. During 1922-27 he held, in turn, the posts of Deputy Director of Design and Deputy Director of Technical Development at the Air Ministry.

He was in command of the Far East Flight which left England in October, 1927, for Singapore and afterwards flew from Singapore round Australia back to Singapore and from Singapore to Hong Kong and back a distance of more than 27,000 statute miles. On the formation of the Far East Command, with Headquarters at Singapore, he was appointed Commanding Officer. In April, 1931, he was posted to the Air Ministry as Director of Technical Development, and in December, 1934, he became Commandant of the Royal Air Force College.

In the New Year Honours, 1936, he was appointed a Companion of the Order of the Bath.



It is to be regretted that a man with such a brilliant future in Iraq has lost his life in this way. It was typical of him that he lost his life in the defence of a friend.

"I am sorry I have not been able to meet your kind request for a F./Lieuts. J. Mutch, W. T. F. Wightman, C. E. J. Baines, M. H. humorous article, but you might consider a few of my experiences on leave worth publication—they would perhaps interest people who are looking for

> "My idea of a holiday is a complete change of environment. With the prospect of leave and this idea in my mind I hurried to the local branch of Mr. Cook and bought a copy of his Continental time-table. With this fascinating volume and an atlas I soon began to indulge in the most stupendous imaginary travels. I pottered about in the Balkans; I coasted along the shores of the Caspian; crack-jaw names which before had seemed only fit for limericks tripped from my tongue when the conversation turned to ways and means of 'getting home.' It was all very disturbing, but good for one's geography.

> "But leave was becoming imminent. Time was short and money was shorter, and some practical plans had to be devised. I found two boats

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which promised plenty of change at a reasonable cost. One was Italian and the other French.

- "To cut a long story short, I sailed from Alexandria on the Italian steamer Equitta, which reached Piræus ten days later. That gives me ten days in Athens, after which I catch a French steamer back to Beyrouth.
- "I am writing from Athens, so that the second half of the trip is still to come, but the first half has been grand. From Alexandria we made Port Said the next day. My last visit was almost exactly a year before, on a trooper. This time I was with a fellow-passenger who had lived in Egypt for thirty years (and still had a broad Scots accent), and during the seven or eight hours we had ashore I saw—with his help—a little more of Port Said than on my previous visit.
- "We sailed in the evening, having taken on board a batch of deck passengers, odd-looking little people, including Jews from the Yemen who were bound for Palestine.
- "We reached Jaffa in the morning. There is no deep harbour there and ships have to lay off about four miles. As there was half a gale blowing we could not land, and after a few hours we left for Haifa, which we reached in the early hours of the next day.
- "Here we went alongside one of the very fine wharves. I was invited to join a party motoring to Jerusalem and back (we had fourteen hours' stay), but as I hope to call there on my return I decided to explore Haifa instead. The time available allowed us to do this quite leisurely, and there was no question of 'doing the sights' in the popular tourist manner. When we left Haifa I found a new table companion, an old American lady with strong views upon every 'ism' from Anarchism to Zionism. Meals, by the way, were invariably eight courses long. Italian wine was extremely cheap, and I drank Chianti with my collazzione and my franzo every day. They also produced 'am-an-eggie' for my breakfast, done en casserole and very nice too.
- "Beyrouth was our next stop. Here the original Jerusalem car party hustled off to Damascus. This, I think, is stretching things a bit fine, because we had only nine hours ashore, which one can spend very pleasantly in snooping around Beyrouth itself.
- "On the following morning we anchored off Alexandretta. This is a small place in a lovely setting of mountain country, and here I did go off on a motor jaunt. Antioch is only a couple of hours' drive away, and I very much wanted to see the mosaics which have been discovered there by the Princeton University Expedition. It was a delightful drive over a tortuous but beautifully banked mountain road, and the mosaics were worth leagues to see. Incidentally, we had a shouting match on the quayside with car drivers and boatmen, but that is the way of the Levant, and we all parted in great good humour.
- "We arrived at Mersin, in Turkey, early next morning. I had anticipated difficulties with passports in Turkey, but we got ashore without any trouble. There was little of interest to be seen, so I hired a gharri for the

- price of one Turkish pound (they are, at the moment, six to our pound) and went off to swim farther along the coast. Money, by the way, is one of the small problems on a journey of this sort. One has to be careful, or else one is left with handfuls of small change of different nationalities, worthless outside of their particular countries.
- "It is a good thing to carry some sterling, as it is accepted anywhere. In my case, between Alexandria and Athens, I handled Egyptian, Palestinian, Syrian, French, Turkish, Cypriot, Italian and Greek money. Even after a year of foreign service, I find I have to juggle foreign prices back to English equivalents to get a proper sense of value—and when this has to be applied to a different currency on every successive day it can become a bit confusing.
- "From Mersin to Famagusta, in Cyprus, our next stop, I enjoyed the company at my table of a little Swiss analytical chemist, whose reminiscences were widespread and whose English was formidable.
- "We were due to call at three ports in Cyprus—Famagusta, Larnaca and Limassol—the first two in one day and on to the other next morning. At Famagusta I, therefore, made up a party and hired a car, at a very moderate fee, to tour the island and return to the ship at one of the other ports.
- "We had a good day of sight-seeing and joined the ship at Larnaca. We could not go ashore at Limassol, as we stayed there only four hours.
- "The day after leaving Limassol we got to Antalya, another Turkish port, but decidedly more attractive than Mersin. I had yet another table companion from Cyprus, a Polish woman journalist. We went ashore together and began the day badly with a contretemps with the law, who seized our cameras. Later, however, after we had laid our grievances before an important-looking official whom we found in a police station in the town (it was done in a horrid mixture of French, German and English with many gesticulations and grimaces), the cameras were returned to us, and with only two hours left we leapt into a cab and galloped madly off in all directions, photographing hard all and sundry.
- "Next morning we were in Rhodes, where the Polish lady left, and was replaced by a man who had been everywhere except Jerusalem. (He refuses to go there, he said, because he has so few illusions left.)
- "Rhodes is the most perfectly preserved place I have ever seen. The only harsh note in the place is struck by the modern paintings of the Knights of Malta in the house of that order. They are terrible. Everything else—ramparts, battlements, cobbled streets, and bridges—is in harmony.
- "After leaving Rhodes we sailed through the archipelago, bound for Piræus, which we reached next morning.
- "I am now installed in a pleasant hotel in Athens which for a modest sum gives me a bed, a bath and breakfast. My other meals I take in cafés, and each meal is by way of being an entertainment both from a gastronomic and a social point of view.

An Old Cranwellian writes from Venice:-

"My ideas of Venice were a bit hazy before I arrived-derived more from Savoyard associations of the Kingdom of Baretaria than anything else; but I certainly never expected anything one half so exquisite. After all, in England, when we have a beautiful place-Broadway, for instance-we surround it with hideous bungalows, and build a main road through it, and set up 'Teas' and petrol stations; and if a building falls down we rebuild it in cubes of concrete with windows running round the house corners. Here all is lovely-not so much as a bicycle in the streets, and not one a bomb at anyone and walked out of the League with malicious joy. jarring note of modernity in the whole city. It is as perfect as Nash's Bath

"Nowhere have we been treated as other than honoured and welcome guests. Our politicians are deservedly unpopular, of course, and so far we have shunned the mention of politics; however, our maitre d'hotel (whose memories of London in the '90's as seen by an Italian waiter in a St. Pancras hotel are priceless: Little Tich, Chevalier, Marie Lloyd in 'Ta-ra-ra Boomde-ay,' and so on) remarked, apropos of something else, 'Ah, here in Italy we always know what our Government intends; but the English, they never know what their Government will do next,' to which, of course, we made the obvious answer that our Government did not know that themselves; and he could quite believe it.

"Their Government is nothing if not thorough, and if success can be gauged by the external signs noticed in a ten-day stay in one place-such as healthy, happy children, a population cheerful, polite and alert, a universal and scrupulous cleanliness of street and dwelling-well, democracy is not all we believe it to be; of course, so far, one cannot judge how the regime presses on the individual, and only an economist could tell you (and he would be as likely to be wrong as right) how national finances stand. But to outward appearance this place is sound and prosperous.

"The language seems fairly simple; it is now twelve years since I struggled with Cicero and found diversion in Horace-but our old friend Mensa, a table, Mensa, O table! and the rest begin to float to the top of one's conscious mind after a day or two, and I find it easy enough to construe whole columns of the Popolo d'Italia in not very many minutes.

"Two little notices have tickled me very much-you see them sometimes in cafés and shop windows-I believe they are published more or less under Government auspices :-

- "(1) 'The polite person does not spit on the ground.'
- "(2) 'For the honour of Italy-Cut out bad language. . . . '
- " At night we rather suffer from cats: Venice is a feline paradise; for one thing, there are very few dogs, and those few are all muzzled, and for another they are treated with affection and respect by the human race. Thirdly, no one but ourselves seems to resent the midnight serenade-and

yell; so that two fair-sized cats can entertain several hundred people at once. The cats are rather thin, but yield to none in vocal register and timbre.

"A final complaint is the Continental so-called breakfast.' I solemnly believe that if every non-English European were forcibly fed with two fried eggs and two rashers of bacon every morning, all rearmament would stop, and international bickering come to an end. It is my private belief that this roll-and-coffee idea is sponsored by the International Arms Ring to provoke the uneasiness and discord that could never exist in the owners of wellgrounded stomachs. I think I shall write to Mr. Henderson about it. I have managed to squeeze a matutinal boiled egg out of our landlord, after great efforts, but in the first few days in my pre-luncheon mood I'd have thrown

"As you probably know Venice a great deal better than I do, and also ought to be to-day; and the kindness of the people is unexpectedly universal. can appreciate much of it, through artistic knowledge, that I cannot, this letter probably won't tell you very much that you didn't know already. However, a novice's impressions may amuse you; I wish you were here with us to eat fried crayfish and explain the finer points of the Doge's Palace."

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A native of Hasland, he attended the Hasland C. of E. School, and won a scholarship to the Chesterfield Grammar School. At the age of 18 he determined to make the Army his career, and joined the Grenadier Guards in July, 1908, being promoted Corporal in 1909. In May of the following year he was awarded a medal of the Royal Victorian Order for services in connection with the lying-in-state of King Edward VII. In November, 1912, he was promoted Sergeant, and was promoted instructor to the Guards Depot, where he obtained his Board of Education teacher's certificate.

In 1914 he was promoted to the rank of Company Sergeant-Major, and was transferred from the Guards to the position of instructor at the Royal Military College, Sandhurst. From 1928 until his retirement in 1933, he was Warrant Officer in charge of the cadets at the Royal Air Force College, Cranwell. In the on the active list, with effect from 27th January of this year. King's Birthday Honours of the same year he was awarded the M.B.E., and received the decoration at the hands of His Majesty King George V at an investiture at Buckingham Palace.

On leaving the Service he took up a position at Longton with Messrs. Ind Coope & Allsopp's brewery. Whilst with this firm he received the signal honour of appointment as a member of the King's Body Guard of the Yeomen of the Guard, whose duty it is to attend State functions such as the opening of Parliament, levees and the investitures. 

Thirteenth Annual General Meeting - 23 July 1938

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College Staff Pension Fund instigated by OCA

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ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING HELD ON SATURDAY, JULY 23rd 1938.

Air Vice Marshal Baldwin took the chair.

There were 33 members present.

MINUTES. The minutes of the previous general meeting were read and confirmed.

ACCOUNTS. The audited balance sheet for the twelve months ending 30th April 1938 was submitted to the meeting and passed. The state of the accounts was considered to be very satisfactory.

ANNUAL GRANT TO It was proposed by Squadron Leader Garnons-Williams that the annual grant of £50 for the entertainment of this was seconded by Squadron Leader Charles and passed.

ANNUAL It was proposed by Squadron Leader BEISIEGEL DINNER. that the annual dinner in London be held at the Connaught Rooms. This was seconded by F/Lieut LLOYD and carried. The Chairman said he thought the dinner might more conveniently be held in the West-end. It was explained that previous annual dinners had been held both at the Dorchester and Mayfair Hotels and many adverse criticisms were received about the treatment at these two hotels. It was the general opinion that the dinner held at the Connaught Rooms was very successful and there were no complaints.

It was proposed by the Chairman that the Rev.
McHARDY be asked as Guest of Honour, and Professor
de la BERE as a guest at the next annual dinner. This
was seconded by F/Lieut PINK and carried.

The Secretary informed the meeting that COLLEGE STAFF a Staff Contributory Pension Fund had PENSION FUND. been started for the benefit of college servants which would give each selected employee £1 per week on reaching the age of 65. There was also a Life Insurance policy taken out which would ensure the dependents of each employee eligible for pension the sum of £100 if the employee died before reaching pensionable age. The cost to the College Funds was £433 per annum, and the employees themselves paid £195 in contributions annually. A large sum was required to inaugurate the Fund, and a request had been received from the College Authorities that this meeting might consider helping with a grant. S/Ldr. GARNONS-WILLIAMS said he understood that there were certain old employees not covered by the scheme on account of the expense entailed and he thought some provision should also be made for these employees. After discussion it was proposed by S/Ldr. GARNONS-WILLIAMS that the sum of £125 be given as a grant towards the COLLEGE Staff Pension Fund provided that these old employees who were not now in the scheme were guaranteed similar treatment to those members of the staff were fully This was carried nem. con.

A Hawker Hurricane of No. 111 (Fighter) Squadron, piloted by Squadron Leader J. W. 



Whereupon he has been haled before the Judge who has instantly indicted him on three countes: one, videlicet, that hee was swoln with wine; two, that he was unseemlie in his language; and three, that he had given awaye an officiall secret. Soe offe he goes poor chappe to be concentrated in mein camp.'

"But that is la dernière cartouche. If your Editor wants an article on 'The Secondary Effects of Bending Stresses,' or 'The Dynamical Implications of the Ornithopter,' or 'The Generation of Thermionic Oscillation,' or 'Greek Particles,' or 'Afghan Folk-lore,' I might manage that.

But that is as far as my thin humour runs to-day.

"Fighter Command, where I am, comprises about thirty stations and in the course of my duties I have to visit each of them. As often as not the Commander of the Station is an Old Cranwellian, and the newest recruit an Old Cranwellian too.

"At every station I have met notable courtesy and hospitality. At every station I have poured a modest libation, always at the cost of others, and have raked up Cranwellian embers, sometimes into quite a decent blaze. Those receptions have made a pleasure of a duty; and I wish I could tender my thanks publicly to the Old Cranwellians whom I have encountered in my routine.

Neither he nor his air gunner was injured, but the aircraft was a mass of wreckage, and it took Mehar half an hour to extricate himself; not a

pleasant half-hour with the leaking petrol tank dripping its contents over the wreckage. After getting out, the two of them set out for Jatta Khel, a Tochi Scout post, where they arrived at 5 o'clock the next morning. Luckily they met no tribes-people, though they were followed by wolves, and the air gunner was injured slightly when he fell down a small precipice. Mehar thinks that one such occurrence is quite enough.'

"With me at Bentley Priory are Squadron Leader J. Norwood, in charge of Intelligence; and Squadron Leader C. S. Riccard, who wields the Personnel Branch. Squadron Leader C. E. J. Baines presides over Air Organization; Squadron Leader D. N. Roberts over Air Staff Duties;

and Squadron Leader R. G. M. Walker over Navigation.

"Squadron Leader S. H. Hardy was here for a short time, and was

one of our biggest noises on air frames.

"The picture of Air Commodore R. M. Groves which hangs usually in the College has been exhibited effectively at the Royal Institute Galleries.

"This portrait commemorates the son of the late Mrs. Groves,

nobilis mater nobilis filii,

a stalwart pier and a generous ally of our Service. This picture was the last of her many bequests to us.

"Flight Lieutenant M. K. D. Porter is recovering rapidly from the injury to his foot; and Flying Officer T. D. Calnan at Tangmere is once more a rugger ace.

"Flying Officer A. D. Panton, alas, has had to give up a man's







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OLD CRANWELLIAN NOTES

CONGRATULATIONS to Flight Lieutenant J. W. Bayley on gaining the M.B.E.

Hearty congratulations to Squadron Leaders D. A. Boyle, L. W. Dickens and H. J. Pringle on being awarded the Air Force Cross.

We should like to tender our heartiest congratulations to Group Captain I. T. Lloyd on being awarded the C.B.E. It will be remembered that Group Captain Lloyd was once Chief Instructor at the College.

Squadron Leader F. F. W. Hall is now entitled to the symbol "q.s." against his name in the Air Force List, as he satisfactorily completed the Camberley Staff College course which ended in December, 1938.

In The Aeroplane of 10th May, Lord Malcolm Douglas-Hamilton gives a most instructive and interesting account of a flight he recently made round New Zealand.

We notice with permissible gratification that Air Marshal Sir Arthur Longmore headed the R.A.F. Mission which visited Australia and New Zealand at the request of the Governments of the Dominions.

Squadron Leader J. Addams, A.F.C., flew the first of the two hundred Lockheed bombers, which were ordered by the Air Ministry, from Burbank, California, to New York. He covered the distance, 2,430 miles, in twelve hours' flying time.

Hearty congratulations to Wing Commander C. L. Falconer on his promotion on 1st March, 1939. He was the eighth Old Cranwellian to be promoted to Wing Commander.

In the London Gazette of 28th March, 1939, we notice that Squadron Leader A. R. Glencross was brought to the notice of the Air Officer formerly commanding British Forces in Aden, for distinguished services in connection with operations in the Aden Protectorate on 29th and 30th April and from 6th July to 4th September, 1938.

The Fédération Aéronautique Internationale has awarded the world's long-distance air record to both Squadron Leader R. Kellett and Flight Lieutenant A. N. Combe, the pilots of the two Wellesley aircraft which flew non-stop from Ismailia to Darwin—a distance officially accepted for the record as 7,159 miles.

The International Aeronautical Federation voted Squadron Leader R. Kellett's flight one of the two finest air performances of 1938, and Prince Bibesco, the President of the Federation, has made a personal gift of a cup to him.

The King has been graciously pleased to approve of the award of the Air Force Cross to Squadron Leader Richard Kellett and Squadron Leader Andrew Nicholson Combe, of the Royal Air Force Long Range Development Unit, in recognition of services rendered as members of the crews of two aircraft which, having flown non-stop from Ismailia to Port Darwin on 5th to 7th November, 1938, established a world's long-distance record.

All Cranwell personnel will be pleased to hear that Air Vice-Marshal Cave-Browne-Cave is well on the way to recovery from his recent very serious accident. It will be remembered that the Air Vice-Marshal was Commandant of the College.

On 1st March, 1939, the Commander-in-Chief, General Sir Robert Cassels, approved the immediate award of the Distinguished Flying Cross to Squadron Leader R. C. Mead, of No. 20 (Army Co-operation) Squadron R.A.F., for conspicuous gallantry in dispersing from the air a tribal lashkar which attacked Datta Khel Post, in Waziristan.

During the night of 5th February the tribesmen were attacking the post with two guns when Squadron Leader Mead, in an aircraft, arrived from Miram Shah and, guided by the flash of the tribesmen's rifles, and aided by light signals from the post, attacked the tribesmen with bomb and machine gun. Four tribesmen of the gun crews were either killed or injured, and one gun was damaged. On the night of 7th February a similar attack was repeated by the tribesmen, and Squadron Leader Mead once more set out from Miram Shah and carried out two sorties in the dark.

Squadron Leader Mead's flights on these occasions are regarded officially as "a splendid example of skill and devotion to duty under fire."

Squadron Leader E. C. Huddleston and Flight Lieutenant L. B. B. King have gone to Eskisehir as instructors at the Turkish Flying Training School.

He was a capable boxer and captained the College team in 1936.






We have again received a letter from Captain R. de la Bère, full of interest to Old Cranwellians, excerpts of which are given below:-

OCA Pauses to deal with WWII (1)


The outbreak of war posed obvious problems to the OCA, as portrayed by the Chairman at the time, one Sqn Ldr Dermot Boyle. His note to members below is contained in the OCA minutes, which is still held in safe keeping. The content of Sir Dermot Boyle's letter is self-explanatory and states clearly that the RAF College remained in operation as a Flying Training School. The response recorded by the OCA's Honorary Secretary, 'Harry' Lager, demonstrates the strength of feeling for the OCA after only 13 years of operation. Volume 2 of this tribute album starts with the reinstatement of the OCA at the end of WWII, and that of its main communications medium, the College Journal.







OLD CRANWELLIAN ASSOCIATION. ROYAL AIR FORCE COLLEGE, CRANWELL 21-10-39. The present situation makes it impracticable to call a General Meeting of our Association, so I am writing to some hundred members whose present addresses are known in order to obtain their views on certain points which have arisen as a result of the War. The Royal Air Force College is being retained in name during the War but it ceases to function as an establishment for training permanent officers and instead becomes a Flying Training It is impracticable in War to hold Annual Dinners or "At Homes' and the dispersal of personnel directly associated with the Royal Air Force College makes the continuance of the Journal The consequence is that it will be impossible to give members material value for their annual subscriptions during war and on such a short view members must be regarded as free to cancel their subscriptions, should they wish to do so. On the other hand, it has taken 13 years to build the Association up to its present membership and only now is it reaching a size when it can be of real value. To allow its membership to decline, owing to what it is hoped are only temporary conditions, would seem to be a great mistake. I therefore propose that the Committee should not instruct members to cancel their subscriptions and that at the first General Meeting after the War, decisions be made as to whether, or not, refunds should be made to members who have had no material value for their subscriptions during war-time. By this means, the Association will be kept fully alive and its financial strength will be maintained during a period when compassionate calls upon its resources may well be more than in

OCA Donations - 1926-1939

Although the OCA was set up primarily to establish and maintain contact between College alumni, the annual subscriptions funded many independent and joint initiatives to the benefit of the College. In proposing the formation of an "Association of Officers", GR Beamish envisaged funds being raised to fund annual reunions. In reality, member subscriptions would fund many more initiatives from annual contributions to the College. Journal and College Sports funds to the one-off donations to fund the production of paintings (of College icons), and other College artefacts.

At one point, OCA members' subscriptions funded supplementary pensions for long serving College staff. This ceased shortly after WWII when war pensions were introduced, but even then the OCA set up a Staff Gratuities Fund for much the same purpose.

The table below lists some of the main contributions made during pre-WWII years.

Volume 1 Summary

Viscount Lord Trenchard, the first RAF CAS, set up the RAF College as a centre of officer training excellence modelled on counterpart academies at Britannia, Dartmouth, and RMAS Sandhurst.

During the early 1920s, the continued independent existence of the RAF and its control of naval aviation were subject to a series of Government reviews. The Balfour Report of 1921, the Geddes Axe of 1922, and the Salisbury Committee of 1923 all found in favour of the RAF's continued existence, despite lobbying from the Admiralty and opposition in Parliament. On each occasion, Trenchard and his staff officers, supported by Christopher Bullock, worked to show that the RAF provided good value for money, and was required for the long-term strategic security of the United Kingdom.

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So the future and very existence of the RAF was under constant threat during its formative years of the 20s and 30s. The product of the RAF College would have to meet exacting standards if the expectations of the RAF were to be met. Those expectations were articulated in no uncertain terms in Trenchard's foreword to the fist College Journal of September 1920. Twenty-seven years late, he was able to acknowledge that, during WWII, the RAF and the College had met those expectations, to act as an inspiration for all future cadets to follow.

Clearly, the cadets of the 1920s and 30s got the message. Despite or may be because of the rigorous and strictly disciplined training regime they endured for two intensive years, they formed an unbreakable bond with the establishment now generally regarded as the RAF's 'Spiritual Home' with, at its epicentre, the iconic CHOM - the College.

Reading through the OCA Notes and the OCA AGM minutes, one cannot help but conclude that the 'pull' of the College - alma mater - and the College Journal were instrumental in maintaining that bond. The commitment and dedication of cadets once graduated, not merely to their professional responsibilities but also to the upkeep of the 'family', is self-evident from the progress made by an OCA in its own formative years. The OCA Notes and AGM minutes betray the unique camaraderie.

It was decided to form this Cadet College because it was realized from the first that such a College was the essential foundation of a separate Air Service. This College, in conjunction with the School of Technical Training for Boys at Halton, will have the making or marring of the future of this great Service, which was built up during the war by all the gallant Pilots and Observers and other ranks who fought through it, and won a name in the air second to none in the world. It always held, and finally conquered completely, the German Air Service. If it is to continue its great work, which I am convinced we all intend that it shall do, we all realize that it has to live up to its war reputation, and we must ensure by every means in our power that it does so.

We have to learn by experience how to organize and administer a great Service, both in peace and war, and you, who are at present at the College in its first year, will, in future, be at the helm. Therefore you will have to work your hardest, both as Cadets at the College and subsequently as officers, in order to be capable of guiding this great Service through its early days, and maintaining its traditions and efficiency in the years to come.
